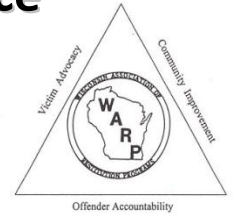

1- RJ 101

Barbara A. Nimmer, Trainer, Consultant and Mediator. This workshop is getting back to the basics. As RJ becomes bigger and money becomes scarce, RJ programs morph into something new. This workshop is designed to bring us back to the core values of RJ.

2- Restorative Justice and Truancy Prevention: A Multi-Dimensional Approach

1-Sexting – A Restorative Approach

Shana Lewis, Investigator Crystal Sedevie, Best Lisowski, Dr. Troy D. Harcey. This diverse panel will discuss and define: Sexting, Cyberbullying, and other technological crimes. In our recent history teens that have sent, received, and or forwarded nude pictures of themselves or others have been charged with distribution and/or possession of child pornography. While this has presented not only legal challenges, the fall out in social circles has been felt in great personal costs as well. In this digital age, we strive to keep pace with the difficult situations that social media and technology can present while maintaining a restorative approach in handling these sensitive situation.

2- How to Evaluate Your Restorative Justice Program

Bill Zollweg from University of Wisconsin – La Crosse. The presentation will cover the basic types of evaluation research, including how to collect information to help improve your program effectiveness. Participants will learn about the types of research that can be conducted "in-house" and the types of research that requires an independent evaluator. Participants will learn: 1. The steps to follow for developing an evaluation instrument, 2. How to administer the evaluation instrument, and 3. How to analyze the data that has been collected. The presentation is well suited for professionals that have had a program evaluation and those that are just thinking about having an evaluation done.

Creating a Recovery Culture

Tamra Olman, Human Services Program Coordinator- Recovery Support Specialist at the Wisconsin Resource Center. This session will discuss the 4 key components necessary to create a "safe" space where healing, wellness, and recovery can take place. In order to have a successful recovery culture, all parties must be involved and on board. We will take a brief look at the impact of trauma on the brain and the individual's world view, the value of PCP (person centered planning), SBA (Strength Based Approach), and MI (Motivational Interviewing) in a recovery environment.

10:30- 12:00 Creating a Recovery Culture (Part 2)

The objectives in this session are 1. Understand the importance of client engagement in successful recovery (*Compliance vs. Engagement*) 2. Explore- "what's in it for me?" 3. Recognize trauma history plays a roll in a person's wellness and recovery 4. Understand the value of using a strength-based approach, PCP, and TIC (*Language & approach*) 5. Acknowledge that defining success in recovery is subjective (*Recovery is not linear- it is ongoing*) 6. Know that "What you do matters!"
