Course Descriptions and Methods of Evaluation

COURSE TITLE: EVIDENCE COURSE #: 7191 101

PROFESSOR: Scoville

^{**}This course is offered on a 100% remote basis. Please note, the final for this course will be in person.

^{***}Rooms will be assigned after the preferred registration deadline.

DESCRIPTION: Survey of the law of evidence, focusing upon the Federal Rules of Evidence and corresponding Wisconsin rules. Subjects covered include evidentiary burdens and presumptions, relevancy, hearsay, impeachment and examination of witnesses, selected privileges, and authentication of physical and demonstrative evidence.

CREDITS: 3

PREREQUISITES: Legal Analysis, Writing, and Research 1 and 2

COURSE STATUS: Required for graduation; offered on a 100% remote basis METHOD(S) OF EVALUATION: Scheduled final examination, class participation

FACULTY COMMENTS: The final exam consists of essay questions and short-answer questions. Class participation is used as a tie-breaker in cases where two students receive the same score on the final exam but the curve requires one of them to receive a higher grade in the course than the other.

COURSE TITLE: TRUSTS AND ESTATES COURSE #: 7332 101

PROFESSOR: Murray

DESCRIPTION: Examination of intestate succession, wills and various will substitutes, inter vivos and testamentary trusts, future interests in real and personal property, and problems arising in the administration of decedents' estates and trusts.

CREDITS: 3

PREREQUISITES: Legal Analysis, Writing, and Research 1 and 2; Property

COURSE STATUS: Required for graduation

METHOD(S) OF EVALUATION: Scheduled final examination, class participation

WORKSHOPS

COURSE TITLE: CONTRACT DRAFTING COURSE #: 7722 101

PROFESSOR: Carpenter

DESCRIPTION: This workshop introduces students to the fundamental skills common to drafting and

negotiating contracts. CREDITS: 2

PREREQUISITES: Contracts, Legal Analysis, Writing, and Research 1 and 2

COURSE STATUS: Workshop

METHODS OF EVALUATION: Paper, class participation

FACULTY COMMENTS: During this course, students will draft 3–4 graded contracts. Students may be required to complete one of those drafting projects during the exam period. However, it is more likely that the final assignment will be due on the last day of class.

ADVANCED LEGAL RESEARCH

COURSE TITLE: ADVANCED LEGAL RESEARCH: COURSE #: 7950 101

WISCONSIN

PROFESSOR: Olson

DESCRIPTION: This variable topic course focuses on practical legal research strategies leading students to make informed choices about the type and format of resource to use, an efficient method for using resources, and understanding of the costs involved with various resources. Students will complete a series of research assignments demonstrating appropriate research techniques and problem-solving. This course satisfies the advanced legal research requirement.

CREDITS: 1

PREREQUISITES: Legal Analysis, Writing, and Research 1 and 2

COURSE STATUS: Advanced Legal Research Course METHODS OF EVAULATION: Class participation, project(s)

FACULTY COMMENTS: Students will complete in-class research exercises, weekly of-class legal research assignments, and a final research project to be distributed and completed after the last class session.

COURSE TITLE: ADVANCED LEGAL RESEARCH IN COURSE #: 7955 101

SPORTS LAW

PROFESSOR: Anderson

DESCRIPTION: This variable topic course focuses on practical legal research strategies leading students to make informed choices about the type and format of resource to use, an efficient method for using resources, and understanding of the costs involved with various resources. Students will complete a series of research assignments demonstrating appropriate research techniques and problem-solving. This course satisfies the advanced legal research requirement.

CREDITS: 2

PREREQUISITES: Legal Analysis, Writing, and Research 1 and 2, completion of 1L curriculum,

registered Sports Law Certificate candidate or permission of instructor

COURSE STATUS: Advanced Legal Research Course; offered on a 100% remote basis

METHOD(S) OF EVALUATION: Paper, Class Participation

FACULTY COMMENTS: Students will conduct research to complete assignments in virtually every class. The course will culminate in a research project.

Summer Add/Drop Policy

- The Law School Academic Regulations govern the add/drop policy for summer courses. To discuss adding or dropping a summer Supervised Field Placement, Clinic, or Judicial Internship, students must contact Professor Anne Kearney, director of clinical education.
- Prior to the first course meeting, a student may add or drop a course without obtaining permission.
 Students using financial aid for the summer are strongly encouraged to contact the Office of Financial Aid before making changes that might affect aid.
- Adding a summer course after session/course start:
 - Students may add any course shorter than ten weeks duration without obtaining permission if they do so before the third class meeting or, for courses meeting seven or fewer times, before the second class meeting, but only if the student is eligible to take the course and the course has space available.
- Dropping a summer course after session/course start:
 - A student may drop a summer course shorter than ten weeks duration without obtaining permission if they do so before the third class meeting.
 - After the third class and before the halfway mark of the course, a student may only drop a summer course with the permission of the course instructor and the Assistant Dean of Students. If permission is granted, the title of that course will appear on the student's transcript with a grade of W.
 - After the halfway mark of the course and before the start of exams, a student may only drop a summer course if there are extenuating circumstances and with the approval of the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. If permission is granted, the title of that course will appear on the student's transcript with a grade of W.

Summer Credit Limits

The maximum number of credits that may be attempted during the summer semester is 12.

• A student may take no more than 7 credits in the first summer session, but this limitation does not apply to summer session internships or to other courses, including directed research and graduate assistant, that span both summer sessions.
